System-wide challenges




A number of challenges have been raised in the adult social care sector:



Staff shortages – lack of time for training and development



Limited sharing of data between health and social care organisations



Different tools and ways of working across health and care organisations



Limited use of learning from the COVID-19 pandemic



Current digital tools are **not embedded in the care pathways**



Perception that digital tools are complicated and difficult to use



Lack of knowledge about what digital tools are available



Lack of funding to buy digital products and services.

Background



Digital transformation of health and social care is a top priority for the Department of Health and Social Care and NHS England. The main tools for driving progress to date have been published across many existing strategies and guidance publications.

The NHS Long Term Plan sets out the aspiration to make digitally-enabled care mainstream across the NHS, and Data Saves Lives: Reshaping Health and Social Care with Data – along with What Good Looks Like, Who Pays for What and the Unified Tech Fund – provides the guidance and support Integrated Care Systems (ICSs) need to make this a reality.

ICSs enable the NHS to work closely with local government and other local partners to **build on existing local efforts**; and **strengthen and implement preventative interventions** that will **close the local health and wellbeing gap**.

We are committed to:

- significantly increasing digitisation in social care
- supporting the adoption of care technologies
- building an evidence base
- developing implementation guidance for care providers
- assuring supplier solutions.



The DiSC programme is dedicated to **revolutionising healthcare** through digital innovation, **harnessing the power of technology** to **enhance the health and wellbeing** of the communities we serve through essential digital, data, and technology services.

Our three key areas of focus:



Our vision is to promote independence, choice and quality of life for our residents and support a higher number of people in their own home. We want to help prevent the problems that lead to serious health issues and stays in hospital. We want to give care home staff more time to focus on caring for their residents.

Our approach


The Digitising Social Care (DiSC) Board has been responsible for **bringing together thinking** from across the footprint. This **collaborative leadership** has enabled partners to develop and agree the local digital ambitions and roadmap for delivery.

The Board is supported by a **Steering Group, Local Authority Boards, and a dedicated team** responsible for developing plans for digital transformation.

The DiSC programme has been developed in stages [see right] – consolidating various projects, activities, processes and governance structure which **align with national and local priorities**.



- 1. Understanding the current state establishing baseline data, digital requirements including capabilities
- 2. Future visioning collaborating with stakeholders to develop partnership, process and a shared vision
- 3. Strategic and operational planning establishing governance, process, systems and a communications plan
- 4. Drafting initiating proposals and seeking agreement of stakeholders
- 5. Alignment and refining continuously learning, developing, refreshing, and collaborating to align local, regional and national priorities
- 6. Focus learning to develop a focused, targeted and impactful programme

A model of integrated working

Our successes over the past three years:

- Co-designed and co-produced an ICS-wide digital transformation programme for adult social care
- Established clear and pragmatic governance arrangements setting out decision-making and accountability structures, with shared leadership at strategic, place, political and executive levels
- Hosted dedicated digital leads who have built reputation, trust and strong working relationships between care providers and local authorities
- Set out the building blocks of various strategies to supporting digital transformation across Bedfordshire, Luton and Milton Keynes
- Tracked performance measures by system and place, and shared them with respective governing bodies and place-based committees
- Continued to build a shared understanding among leaders, staff, partners and people – encouraging each partner to influence the risks and benefits and work together to drive collaborative working
- \checkmark Secured around £4 million for **investing in digitising social care**.



We still need to:

- Move away from short term, last-minute non-recurrent funding arrangements
- Integrate ambitions across health and social care from the top
- Respond to the What Good Looks Like 'People at the Heart of Care' reform white paper (well-led, ensure smart foundations, safe practice, support workforce, empower people, improve care, and healthy populations).





Outcomes

Return on investment





- Reduction in number of routine night-time physical checks = non-cash releasing benefit of approx £19,424 a year per care home (assuming 5 mins per check)
- Reduction in alters checks = non-cash releasing benefit of approx £48,921 a year per care home (assuming 10 mins per check)





visits a year and £57,096 of time to invest
Allows re-investment of 277 weeks of residents remaining at home rather than in a care home = £229,608

25% reduction in routine site contacts = **732**

 60% ROI; £4.7m investment expected to provide £2.8m net system gain over 3 years





- Reduction of A&E attendances = £8,136
- Reduction of overnight stays = £8,664
- £89k (67.6%) ROI in Year 1, projected to be 155% in Year 2 and Year 3

Benefits

- Increased digital maturity and knowledge about what digital tools are available
- Supporting care providers through increased funding and efficiencies to reduce impact of staff shortages
- Reducing pressures on health and care through different tools and ways of working
- Improved integration and connectivity through better sharing of data between organisations
- Increased resident care and supporting independent living as staff are empowered to use the digital tools.



Raising the profile of the programme



BLMK Digitising Social Care Conference

At our second annual conference in July 2023, around 80 attendees from the adult social care sector gathered to learn about our programme and the technology on offer. Feedback was highly complimentary, and the 2024 conference (planned for September 2024) will focus on our offer to domiciliary care providers.

HSJ Digital Awards 2023

The DiSC programme was shortlisted in the 'Connecting health and social care through Digital' category.

While we did not win, this has raised the profile of our work and generated a great deal of positive interest for the ICS, the programme team and our care providers.

Videos and case studies

Videos of local care home managers and GPs sharing their experiences of using various tools and systems have received 100s of views and helped encourage others to sign up.



Next steps / forward view



Scaling up remote monitoring

With £250,000 from the Health Technology Adoption and Acceleration

Fund, we are scaling up remote monitoring to include Discharge to Assess beds. Work includes developing the clinical assessment form and integration with SystemOne in collaboration with a number GP practices.

Enhanced Wellbeing through Digital programme

We were 1 of 3 ICSs to be awarded £1.1m from NHSE's **Adult Social Care Technology Fund**, which we are using to evaluate **Robopets** and **PainChek** for adults living with or experiencing behaviour that challenges, cognitive impairment, dementia, or communication difficulty. Securing the long-term sustainability of the core programme team

An **outline business case** was produced with local authority partners.

This looked at moving the core DiSC programme team to be **funded as business as usual** in 2025/26 and 2026/27.
